History of Toys

Throughout history, children have loved to play with toys. In 2004, archaeologists found a 4000-year-old stone doll head in the ruins of an ancient Italian village. It had curly hair and had small kitchen items buried with it. One of the oldest toys to be found in Britain was a carved animal that was found near Stonehenge. It is thought to be about 2000 years old! Archaeologists have also found many wooden toys used by the ancient Egyptians, such as toy mice with movable tails, horses on wheels, and spinning tops.

As the years passed, new manufacturing methods were developed and toys began to be made from a variety of materials such as iron, tin, fabric, plastic and electronic parts. You can often tell what period a toy is from based on the materials used to make it.

Dolls have long been a favourite toy and have changed a great deal throughout history. Early dolls were made from wood, clay or stone, whereas modern dolls are usually made from soft plastic. In the 16th and 17th centuries, carved wooden dolls, known as stump dolls, were very common. They consisted of heads and bodies (but no legs) and were dressed in long fabric gowns. In the 1830s, porcelain dolls started to be made. Their faces were usually very pale with features painted on. By the 1850s and 1960s, dolls were made from rubber but plastic became a more common material for making dolls during the 1900s.

History of Toys

The first teddy bears were made in America in the 1900s and were named after the American President at the time, Theodore 'Teddy' Roosevelt. The earliest teddy bears had pointed noses and long arms with eyes made from glass. Modern-day teddy bears have eyes made from plastic. Early teddy bears were not soft and cuddly, but stiff and hard because they were stuffed with fine wood shavings.

Toys made from tin were popular from the 1850s to 1960s, with Germany, the USA and Japan being big manufacturers. Tin toys such as cars, animals and trains were shipped to many parts of the world. These toys were eventually replaced by plastic versions because of safety regulations and the availability of cheap plastic.

Electronic toys are now very common and popular. One of the first electronic toys, an electronic train, was invented in 1901 and was called the Electric Express. By the 1970s, all sorts of electronic toys had been developed, such as talking dolls and bears, remote-controlled vehicles and computer consoles.
